A LISTENING TO JESUS FAITH

Most of us find it relatively easy to believe in Jesus, to believe in the life he lived for us, to believe that he gave up his life for our forgiveness and salvation, to believe that he was raised from the dead in order to lead us in our present situation and to prepare us for life eternal our own resurrection. But I also believe we have a more difficult time listening to and heeding Jesus' counsel and advice, especially in matters related to people whose actions, ideas and views are far different than ours.

We currently live in a fractious world filled with divisiveness and hatred, fueled by an anger bent on vengeance and the elimination of those of whom are perceived to be the opposition or enemy. Even as we claim to be followers

of Jesus, we often attempt to address our issues and problems by resorting to tactics that are contrary to the ways taught by Jesus. The mean-spiritedness that erupts from finger-pointing, name-calling and demonizing those perceived to be different often results in further fanning the flames of hatred and violence. We seem no closer today to the unity and peace Jesus prayed for two millennia ago. What is to be done?

Can and should we take seriously the counsel of Jesus in addressing our differences and the discord that arises from such differences, particularly when the rallying cries from society and church alike often call for vengeance and retaliation? We have grown more accustomed and comfortable with the worldly tactics of demonstrating might and strength against the problems we face rather than adopting the practices which Jesus taught. Do we trust Jesus enough to follow the ways he taught us how to live, particularly in the manner of addressing those perceived to be the enemy, over against the world's current practices. How have these worldly tactics been working?

In Luke 6, we hear these words of Jesus: "Love your enemies, do good to those who hate you, bless those who curse you, pray for those who abuse you." Even in the church, have we come to understand this counsel as outdated, that Jesus' teaching is out of touch with our present reality, that our world is more complex and challenging that when Jesus first taught these precepts? Is it practical or prudent that "if anyone strikes you on the cheek, offer the other also...and give to everyone who begs from you?" Will this not encourage some to further engage in acts of deception and injustice? Is Jesus being oblivious to other's malice and evil intent?

Jesus, in Luke 6, seems to call for a Christian response to the problems we face through and by our perceived differences, not by a knee-jerk reaction against our enemies but by modeling the manner in which God in Jesus addresses the actions of even the unkind and wicked: "Love your enemies, do good, and lend, expecting nothing in return. Your reward will be great and you will be children of the Most High; for He is kind to the ungrateful and the wicked. Be merciful, just as your father is merciful." Does Jesus know something

about the results (reward) of such conduct of which we are presently unaware or unwilling to participate?

And finally, how are we to relate to one another from a Christian perspective, particularly in our disagreements with one another whether it be theological interpretation or church practice? In the living presence of Jesus and by the movement of the Holy Spirit, what enables us to say, "we are in the right and our opponents are in the wrong?" It has been commonplace in our world today, in a judgmental and condemnatory manner, to belittle and decry those who hold views different than our own. Is Jesus on our side, or for that matter, does Jesus necessarily take sides on the issues on which we take sides?

Again, it may be worthy to listen again to Jesus' counsel: "Do not judge, and you will not be judged; do not condemn, and you will not be condemned. Forgive, and you will be forgiven; give and it will be given to you....for the measure you give will be the measure you get back." Before we come to quick and determined conclusions about others and what we might think of and about them, particularly those perceived to be different in idea and action from our own leanings, may we listen to Jesus and pray for his guidance. Before we notice and point out the "speck in another's eye," may we pay attention to what clouds our own view from the way that Jesus wants us to be able to see.

Dandelion Trail Run

Camp Mount Luther will be holding a 5- and 10- kilometer trail run race at the camp on **Saturday, September 5, 2020**. This is an entry-level trail race on Mount Luther grounds with proceeds going to the camp. The start time for the race is 9:00 a.m. Runners decide on race day if they want to do a 5k or 10K (a double loop of the 5K) run. The 10k distance is included in the Rocksylvania 10k race series. Pre-register by August 2I and pay only \$25. Registration opens at 7:30 a.m. on race day. Spectators are welcome as well. A kid's fun run will also be held with two age categories: six and under and 7-10. Special

awards will be presented to every participant in the fun run. Again, this year, a one-mile fun walk on a dirt road will be held with the same registration fees and amenities applying (or you may just walk without

Bishop's Open Golf Classic September 21st


