From Our Pastor...

THE KINGDOM OF HEAVEN HAS COME NEAR

The phrase, "the kingdom of heaven" appears prominently in the Gospel of Matthew, spoken almost exclusively by Jesus. Jesus, and before him John the Baptist, spoke thus, "the kingdom of heaven has come near." What did Jesus and John intend by these words? One should take note that they both used the phrase, "the kingdom of heaven," and not simply the word "heaven" that is used commonly as a directional descriptor of our faith.

That "the kingdom of heaven" has come near suggests movement, movement on God's part in a way not experienced prior to this manifestation spoken and actualized by John and Jesus. But how were their initial audiences able to understand what the Baptist and Jesus meant by this phrase? And how are we to understand it within our faith perspective in the 21st century? Does the movement of "the kingdom of heaven" that Jesus indicated that has come near have shape and form? Is it something that can be recognized by our senses; can we see, hear, touch, and taste it? Is the "kingdom of heaven" a something that is tangible, or rather is it but an idea for which we are called to wrap our hands around it? Does the "kingdom of heaven" represent a newly formed reality or is it a call to see the present life from a new perspective gained from listening to and following Jesus? And how does this phrase "the kingdom of heaven" voiced often in Jesus' ministry connect with our use of the word "heaven"?

In both John the Baptist's and Jesus' usage, "the kingdom of heaven has come near," that is, near enough to evoke some kind of response. The invitation and/ or command from them is for the listener to repent. To repent suggests a need to reevaluate one's perspective about all things upon hearing what had been spoken, and therefore make the necessary changes and adjustments that fit accordingly. In short, both John and

Jesus expected that the "kingdom of heaven" is something the listener is called to respond, a connection of faith and activity, of understanding and life-style. From Jesus' perspective, "the kingdom of heaven" was intimately related to his person as well as his message. That said, are we any closer to understanding "the kingdom of Heaven" as Jesus had wanted us to?

In several references, Jesus indicated that "the kingdom of heaven" is something that can be entered into, easy for some, and more difficult and quite impossible for others. Easy enough for infants and toddlers but quite a challenge for those who are heavily invested and submerged in and of material goods and wealth; easy enough for those who see "the kingdom of heaven" arriving as a gift gracious God, but insurmountable hurdle for those who strive and toil and strain for "acceptable" works and proofs. Hopefully, we are familiar with these statements, warnings from Jesus.

In Matthew 5, we hear this from Jesus: "Unless your righteousness exceeds that of the scribes and Pharisees, you will never enter the kingdom of heaven." And then in Matthew 7: "Not everyone who says to me, Lord, Lord, will enter the kingdom of heaven, but only the one who does the will of my Father in heaven." And then in Matthew 19: "It will be hard for a rich person to enter the kingdom of heaven. It is easier for a camel to go through the eye of a needle than for someone who is rich to enter the kingdom of God." These references may imply the difficulty of entering the kingdom of heaven of one's own accord, or accomplishment, maybe leading some to believe that there is little chance.

But then Jesus also says from Matthew 18: "Unless you change and become like children, you will never enter the kingdom of heaven." Just become childlike, easy as that. So maybe recognition and participation of the nearness of the kingdom of heaven is

Cont'd from page 1: somehow connected to our values and our priorities, and the manner in which we are able to see (or not) the presence of God in our lives, activities, and relationships.

In a reading from Matthew 13, Jesus provides several parables, similes, that begin with "the kingdom of heaven is like..." attempting to provide further insight into his person and mission that began by his announcing that the "kingdom of heaven has come near." This kingdom of heaven is not some distant, other worldly concept, but it's like the stuff that grows in fields and is connected to life broader than just humans, birds mind you. And this kingdom of heaven is like the stuff that expands the possibilities that occur in bread-making. And it's also like treasures and other stuff that can be discovered, at times by accident, and others after a full day of fishing.

The kingdom of heaven isn't a mustard seed; it isn't leaven; it isn't a valued pearl; it isn't a great catch of fish; it isn't even what you might stumble across in a field. But it can begin to be recognized as we engage in such activities and find ourselves in similar places. And all because the kingdom of heaven has, by God's design, come near to us, to each and every one of us. Jesus reminds us that the kingdom of heaven is not some faroff, distantly future possibility if we navigate properly through a series of hoops and hurdles. Rather, the kingdom of heaven is to be recognized and cherished in the here-and -now. But it will depend somewhat on where we place our values and our priorities, and how we get to those places, where we put our trust and our motives and our ambitions. And it may be as simple as a child who looks up to mom and dad and big sister and brother and gives a smile, indicating that it's going to be alright in this big and sometimes scary world.

Following his use of these kingdom of heaven similes, Jesus asks his followers, "Have you understood all this?" Without hesitation, they answered, "yes." Are we able to say the same? How well are we acquainted with the nearness of the kingdom of heaven? Do we see, and hear, and taste, and touch it now, or have our values and priorities taken us in a different direction? Do we see the "kingdom of heaven" with the same simplicity of a child holding onto mom's or dad's hand as they make their way through a crowd, or the child's eyes lighting up with an ice cream cone embedded across her face, or the child covered in mud who comes through the door and meets an exasperated mom who had just finished a day's worth of laundry.

What is important to note about this kingdom of heaven, that comes near to us by God's will, is that it has been brought near to us as a gift, and is to be received in the simplest of fashion. But it can be missed by all sorts of distractions, distractions brought about by the kind of human thought and activity that is more focused on human performance than God's presence, of striving after more of this or that than simply receiving graciously.

So, today, the kingdom of heaven might be like life lived in Union County in the lingering time of a COVID-19 viral pandemic, where a farmer continues to prepare for a harvest in the hot sun; where a mother kisses her children before heading off for a day's work at the local supermarket; where young college students are anticipating a return to in-person instruction; where a police officer questions the potential dangerous possibilities of responding to domestic abuse calls or street disturbances; where children, riding in the back seat, notice a playground and ask, "can we stop to play?", and where the church gathers in faith, love, and hope in times that continue to be uncertain and discomfiting.

God in Christ promises that the kingdom of heaven has come near, filled with hope and possibility, with grace and abundance, with comfort and challenge. Have we noticed? And if not, watch the birds in the fields, smell the bread, stumble across some treasure, go fishing, or better yet watch the children at play before we all get distracted by those values and priorities that can create some distance between God and us. God isn't going away. The kingdom of heaven has come near, and what will it be like today?


