#### From Our Pastor...

# ENTRANCE INTO THE KINGDOM

As did John the Baptist, Jesus began his public ministry by saying, "Repent, for the kingdom of heaven has come near" (or "is at hand"). To live within God's glorious and eternal reign is to respond to this gift in the here-and-now complete trust (faith) and adaptability. The call to repent is a realization that a commitment to change is necessary. Awareness presence of the kingdom of heaven seems highly unlikely for those who would be or are unwilling or unable to make changes in their world-view, lifestyle and commitment to God's possibilities and promises.

The call to repent is a challenge to be moved away, by the power of God's Spirit, from those idolatries that attempt to convince us that we are "right" going in the direction and to be placed firmly in the hands of a God who chooses for us, in the life of Jesus, salvation and life eternal begun in the present. In other words, Jesus is saying, "See, the kingdom of heaven is not something you have to

wait around for, nor is it something to be gained only later by acquiring a special skill set or by attaining a level of religious perfection. It's here for the taking. With faith, eyes of allow yourselves to be moved by God's grace to see and receive the gift, believe. Go ahead, and enter now."

On several occasions in Matthew's Gospel, Jesus against speaks those understandings actions that may and can prove as hindrances for entrance into the kingdom of heaven. Near the beginning of Iesus' Sermon on the Mount, he indicates that "unless your righteousness exceeds that of the scribes and Pharisees, you will never enter the kingdom of heaven" (MT 5:20). How are we to perceive this warning? Does it suggest that the kingdom of heaven demands high standards for entrance, possibly indicating that a particular set of values and actions are more worthy than others, and are rewarded as such? Or Jesus' statement intended to provoke his followers into an understanding righteousness and kingdom of heaven apart from that ascribed by the scribes and Pharisees. which may be suggestive of a system that rewards "certain" works that elevate the doer into an arena of divine favor and castigates those who "fail" at such works? Is the higher righteousness Jesus calls that another "work" imposed upon us or is it simply a way of seeing and believing God's presence at work in our lives?

Later in Matthew's Gospel, **Jesus** again speaks to that which may or possibly prevent entrance into the kingdom of heaven, as he responds to the sadly ridiculous question "Who is the greatest in kingdom of heaven" 18:1). (MT (Seems like those who seek righteousness by their works are always looking for an angle that will lift them to a higher level than others.) Jesus has this to say: "Amen, I you, unless you change and become like children, you will never enter the kingdom of heaven."

Added to this, Jesus speaks favorably to the humility evidenced by child-like awareness, receptivity and trust. Is the change that Jesus

calls for an active shift of strategy and implementation that focuses upon what might work to gain access to the kingdom, or is Jesus calling us away from those learned behaviors that seek to manipulate power, influence and control as regards to our fate or destiny? Entrance into the kingdom of heaven may have less to do with human striving than with a child's view of being cared for absolutely.

Still later in Matthew's Gospel, Jesus again is confronted by a rich person who seeks the way to "get" eternal life- "What good deed must I do?" (MT 19:16). The absurdity of

such questions lingers even as Jesus points us away from absolute trust in our "good works" to gain access to God's favor. "Good works" will flow from reception of God's favor (grace) but are not the means to "get" God's favor. And so Jesus warns, "Amen, I tell you, it will be hard for a rich person to enter the kingdom of heaven. Again I tell you, it is easier for a camel to go through the eye of a needle than for someone who is rich to enter the kingdom of God" (MT 19:23-24). Wealth may get us things by worldly standards, but it serves as a hindrance in becoming able to see and

experience the favor God lays before us as gift.

Entrance into the kingdom of heaven, by Jesus' statements, may seem difficult if not impossible, but only as we maintain an adherence to our own motivations, desires, and actions as the means necessary for such entrance. We fail not by a lack of effort or production, but simply by not trusting in the possibility of God who provides for us the kingdom as a gift of love. Believe, that you may see!
