From Our Pastor...

## A LENTEN INVENTORY FOR DISCIPLES

The liturgical season of Lent began in the early church as an intentional catechetical time of forty days to prepare candidates for baptism at the Easter vigil. That practice continues into the present. But in today's world, many Christians who are already baptized see Lent as an intentional and intensive opportunity to refocus on what it means to live out their Christian faith, to renew their commitment to follow Christ, to confess their sin, to receive the gift of God's forgiveness, and to engage with others throughout the world in the manner demonstrated by Jesus' example and teaching- to see our lives formed as disciples of Christ.

To be a disciple of Jesus entails much more than acquiring knowledge of Jesus and his teaching. Discipleship involves putting into practice what Jesus teaches and demands of those who take up his invitation to follow him. For disciples of Jesus, Lent becomes an opportunity to get better acquainted with Jesus and with ourselves as the result of his presence with and for us. Disciples of Jesus are called to continuously bear witness before the world of what God has done, is doing, and will continue to do in and through Christ Jesus as Lord and Savior. To do so bears a constant need to address our allegiances

and alignments. To whom and to what do we devote our loyalty? And so we ask:

Do we do what we do because others are doing it, and we don't want to be left out? Do we do what we do to feel good, to feel good about ourselves, to feel good about our accomplishments? Do we do what we do to promote ourselves, to access power and privilege, to pave a way for success and status? Do we do what we do to achieve a sense of comfort and consolation? Do we do what we do to stave off our fears, to extinguish our doubts, to hide our weaknesses? Do we do what we do to shelter ourselves from vulnerability, to flee from any revelation of our true selves, to veil our imperfections, to mask our blemishes? Do we do what we do to protect ourselves from the hurts that may come about by being fully engaged in our world and relationships, from our own insecurities, from a stubbornness against change? Thus, we may be reminded of W.H. Auden's lines in "The Age of Anxiety": "We would rather be ruined than changed/we would rather die in our dread/ than climb the cross of the moment/ and let our illusions die." Or:

Do we do what we do because we acknowledge what Jesus has done and will continue to do for us, commit ourselves to follow Jesus wherever he leads us, obey whatever he demands and expects of us,

see the peace and salvation that he alone can offer?

As disciples of Jesus, we are called to be apostolic (that is, sent-out ones) and faithful, not calling attention to ourselves but to Jesus and the reign of God which he brings near. Disciples of Jesus are called to be hospitable and humble, gracious and merciful, generous and inspiring (by the way of the spirit of Jesus). Knowing the story about Jesus is not enough; we must see as Jesus sees in order to be able to do as Jesus does. The crosses we bear as disciples of Jesus are to be determined by his cross. In the words of Stanley Hauerwas, "Jesus is calling us not to attend to our own goodness or our loves, but rather to follow him."

Disciples of Jesus are called to trust in the abundance of God in the face of the scarcity played throughout the world that is borne of fear and rejection, violence and separation, anger and greed, covetousness and callousness. Even so, disciples of Jesus are to "travel light," having "nothing at their disposal" other than the authority they have been given by Jesus and a promise, a life in God's eternal kingdom. So, let go and let's go.
