PASTOR'S PARAGRAPHS

Grace and peace to you!

I am writing this letter in Nebraska on my last day of vacation. This past week has been filled with many emotions as I spent time with family and remembering the life of my uncle Allen Jessen. I apologize for not getting this letter out sooner. The time leading up to my vacation got a little hectic. As I was preparing to write this letter the other day, I jokingly asked one of my nieces if they would like to write it for me, and surprisingly, she said yes. So, the rest of this letter is written by Mackenzie Crosgrove, and she talks about relationships. I hope you enjoy it!

"True love begins when nothing is looked for in return. So, what defines it? True love is a strong and lasting affection between two people in a happy, passionate, and fulfilling relationship. Each relationship should be in a form of a triangle. Why, you may ask? Well, the top corner is God, and each side corner is one person of the couple. To have a fulfilling relationship, couples need to keep God at the center of their relationships. 1 John 4: 19 says that 'We love because he first loved us.' The Lord Jesus Christ has loved and still loves us for dying on the cross and forgiving our sins. We need to make God a priority in those personal relationships because he will guide us and our spouse or significant other in those tribulations of life. We want God to fight those battles and lay those fears at His feet.

God does not have to only be the center of a relationship between two



PENTECOST



The two most common Pentecost symbols represent the Holy Spirit. A descending dove is frequently used to symbolize the coming of the Spirit, since the Gospel of Luke reports that the Holy Spirit came to Jesus at his baptism in the form of a dove. (Luke 3:22). Tongues of fire are also used to symbolize the Holy Spirit, based on the account of Pentecost found in Acts 2:1-4. The liturgical color for the Day of Pentecost is bright red, which reminds us of the fire of the Spirit.

Bright red is also the color of the geraniums we use to decorate the sanctuary on Pentecost. If you would like to donate some geraniums for this purpose (the plants will then be planted around the church), please fill out the form below and return it to Janice Wagner or Margie.

Retirement

Jeffrey "Woody" Wenrich has retired after serving the military for 42 years. He is the son of Benivel Wenrich and the late Barbara Herrold Wenrich. He graduated in 1978 from Mifflinburg High School. Jeff had a passion for traveling the world, hunting, fishing, baseball, and interest in the Air Force.

In 1979, he joined the Air Force and attended a five-week Basic Training Course in San Antonio, Texas, and after Basic Training attended technical school at Chanute AFB, Ill. Jeff attended the Fuels career field and after technical school was assigned to Kadena AB, Japan. While at Kadena AB, he was assigned to the 18th Supply Squadron refueling all types of military and commercial aircraft.

After Japan, he volunteered for Europe and was assigned to the 81st Fighter Sq. RAF Bentwaters-Woodbrige, UK, where he became a Fuels Laboratory Technician sampling, testing, and analyzing several types of petroleum products for two years. After traveling to various parts of Asia and Europe, he decided to volunteer to go back to Asia and was assigned to the 51st Supply Squadron, Osan AB, Republic of Korea.

While assigned to Korea, Jeff continued to sample and test different petroleum products, and one particular aircraft fuel he tested was the special fuel issued to the U-2 spy aircraft. Jeff spent 2 years in Korea and then volunteered for Japan. He was assigned to the 475 Supply Squadron and oversaw the Fuels Laboratory in his last two years, taught students all over the Pacific, Fuels War Material Assets for deployment to hostile environments. Jeff was socially active and became a Master Mason, involved in American/Japanese Civic events, taught English to Japanese students, called bingo at the NCO Club, and coached/played fast-pitch softball, slow-pitch softball, and baseball.

In 1988, the Pacific Headquarters Chief asked Jeff if he would like to go to Hawaii to work on the Pacific Headquarters Staff, at Hickam AFB. Jeff worked at Base Level Fuels as a Quality Control Inspector and 18 months later joined the HQ Pacific staff to Inventory Manager/War Planner for all the Pacific.

Jeff would fly back and forth to Pennsylvania to hunt white tail in the fall. In the summer of 1991 he got an assignment to Elmendorf AFB, Alaska. His dream of hunting and fishing became a reality. Jeff was the Operations Manager for Fuels, and later worked as the Environmental Chief, and then on to become the Superintendent of the Fuels Branch. Jeff met some great Alaskan natives and would fly out to a remote village and hunt with the natives, taking moose and caribou. Fishing the world class rivers and streams of Alaska for the varied species of salmon and trout. Departing Alaska after four years was hard. Prior to departing Alaska, a package was sent forward to the Pentagon in DC, to nominate Jeff as the "Best Superintendent in the Air Force for Fuels": for 1995.

Jeff's next assignment was back to Osan AB, Korea to manage all the collocated bases in Korea which totaled six in all. On his third month in Korea he was approached by the Commander and recognized in front of all his peers as being selected as the "Best Superintendent in the Air Force for Fuels" for 1995. He was flown to the Pentagon for a special ceremony and toured all the memorials, which was one of the highlights of his career which were many, but none as significant as this prestigious award. In 1997, he headed back to Hawaii.

From 1997 to 1999, he was the Fuels Superintendent for the 15 Supply Squadron, Hickam AFB, Hawaii. He managed 30 civilians and 49 military. He won countless awards for the "Best Fuels Branch" in the Pacific and in the Air Force. He was nearing the end of his 20-year career when the base decided to contract out military jobs. Jeff would take one last job, a special duty job in Korea.

Jeff worked for the Defense Logistics Agency overseeing all the movement of fuel from the southern half of the Korean peninsula to Seoul. He was a Quality Surveillance Representative, overseeing the movement of pipeline fuel transfers, T-5 petroleum tankers and barges on the Korean peninsula.

In 2001, Jeff retired from the Air Force after 22 years of service. In August 2002, he would become a civil service employee with the Air Force as the night shift fuels supervisor. Jeff would oversee the refueling of numerous Presidents arriving at Joint Base Pearl Harbor Hicam. He was personally involved in the refueling of "Air Force One" with President Bush, Obama, Trump and Biden. He was also involved with

foreign dignitaries from Japan, Korea, and China. Jeff enjoyed the military lifestyle and working with the different branches of the service. He also worked with the Army part-time as a contractor for 17 years at Schofield Barracks, Hawaii managing and overseeing the largest military fueling station in the Pacific. Not many people can say they were with three branches of the military. In all, 22 years Air Force active duty, 8 years civil service with the Navy, and 17 years Army as a contractor.

Jeff's military decorations include the Meritorious Service Medal with one oak leaf cluster and the Air Force Commendation Medal with four oak leaf clusters. He retired from the rank of Senior Master Sergeant, April 1, 2001. On December 31, 2022, he retired as a Wage Supervisor from civil service.

Since his retirement Jeff and his wife, Tharifah, have returned to Pennsylvania and are currently living in Mifflinburg. Jeff is working as a driver at Susquehanna Valley Limousine and as an examiner for PennDot in Selinsgrove.

## Condolences


Our sympathy is extended to the family of Mary Alice Deihl, 87, who entered into eternal rest on April 20 at Evangelical Community Hospital.


As of this newsletter we have \$806.55!!


